Control of Burning in Bega Valley Shire

Why has Council introduced controls on burning?

There have been an increasing number of enquiries relating to burning by residents of the Bega Valley Shire. The majority have been complaints relating to smoke production, odour and human health effects. The indiscriminate burning of waste in the open increased the levels of fine particulate material in the air that subsequently impacted on community health. The main health effects of fine particulate material includes: -

- Increased frequency of asthma attacks
- Increased activity restrictions due to adverse lung reactions
- Increased potential for severe respiratory distress and heart attacks
- Increased mortality due to heart disease and respiratory illness.

In response, Council has introduced a Clean Air Procedure to assist in reducing the occurrence of open burning so as to minimise the health impacts on the wider Bega Valley Shire community. There are many alternatives available to property owners and managers in lieu of burning. Council offers a garden organic collection system within certain urban and village areas, and where provided, property owners can request (for a fee) additional garden organic collections. Mulching and composting of vegetative matter should also be considered as alternatives to burning.

What is Council's Clean Air Procedure about?

The Protection of the Environment Operations (Clean Air) Regulation 2010 allows councils to approve open burning of dead and dry vegetative material to certain cases and classes of people. Bega Valley Shire Council's Clean Air Procedure provides a practical and controlled method of managing open burning of vegetative waste on properties that require this method of waste disposal.

Does this Procedure and regulation apply to my land?

Yes. The Protection of the Environment Operations (Clean Air) Regulation 2010 applies to the entire Bega Valley Shire Council Local Government Area. Under this regulation it is an offence for person/s to burn material in the open without having the appropriate approval or exemptions in place. Please refer to Council's Clean Air Procedure to better understand how the approval and exemption processes work. The Procedure can be viewed on Council's website www.begavalley.nsw.gov.au. Can I burn off general waste in my backyard?

No. The burning of general waste is prohibited in Bega Valley Shire Council area except where no garbage service is provided. Burning this type of material in the open creates pollution that contributes to many forms of respiratory illness. Burning general waste is prohibited under the Protection of the Environment Operations (Clean Air) Regulation 2010.

Can I burn vegetation in the open at my property?

Yes. Burning can only take place where an approval has been issued. Generally for urban and village areas you will need to complete this application form, and wait for Council to determine your application. You will need to comply with all the conditions listed in Appendix 2 of the Clean Air Procedure. If you live in most rural areas of the Shire, provided you comply with all the conditions listed in Appendix 1 of the Clean Air Procedure, you do not need to get any other approvals from Council.

Do I still need to get permits or approvals from the NSW RFS or Fire & Rescue NSW?

Yes. Approvals under the Protection of the Environment Operations (Clean Air) Regulation 2010 do not remove the need to also obtain whatever other permits or approvals to burn. During declared bushfire danger periods you will need to obtain a permit from the relevant fire authority. A fire permit is also needed at anytime when lighting fires that are dangerous to buildings.

Is there any penalties for non-compliance?

Yes, Council's Authorised Officers and certain Officers of other authorities are empowered to serve Penalty Notices where it can be established there has been a breach of the Regulation such as, burn without an approval or not in accordance with an approval, burning otherwise than to prevent/ minimise air pollution or burn a prohibited article. Penalties are set by the Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997 currently exceed \$500 for individuals and \$1,000 for corporations.
