Award winning prospectus

Bega Valley Shire Council is celebrating after receiving a prestigious Local Government NSW RH Dougherty Award for community reporting last week.

The RH Dougherty Awards are named after former Local Government Association President, Robert Henry (Bob) Dougherty and recognise and encourage greater understanding and communication by Councils to their local communities.

It was the Infrastructure Prospectus that caught the eye of the selection panel of leading experts in the communications field and announced as the winner in the 'Reporting to Your Community' category for Councils from 30,000 – 70,000 in population.

Council's Acting General Manager, Anthony Basford, said the prospectus was developed to assist in driving investment in our area.

"It outlines a carefully mapped and scoped list of strategic investment opportunities across the Shire," Mr Basford said.

New contributions system good for business

Bega Valley Shire Council is putting local businesses first by becoming one of the first Councils in NSW to adopt a low upfront charge model for collecting business Water Supply and Sewerage Section 64 contributions.

It had been identified that the previous requirement to pay upfront could be seen as a deterrent to development in the Shire, with many businesses required to pay large amounts before the first customer even walked through the door.

The Section 64 headworks charges apply for commercial and industrial developments that place an additional load on water supply and sewerage systems.

The new high consumption system introduces a user-pays model, making the system fairer, more affordable, more transparent and more attractive to business.

Council's Water and Sewerage Assets Development Engineer, David Rodgers, said the new system will remove a significant financial deterrent to new businesses, or those relocating to new premises.

"Importantly all commercial and industrial customers will now pay for the water and sewerage service capacity they actually use, instead of paying upfront for their predicted use," Mr Rodgers said.

"We are very happy to better support small business in particular through taking this step and we feel strongly that it will encourage business growth and new start-up businesses.

"It will also act as an incentive for businesses to reduce their water consumption, with those using less water consequently paying less.

"The change is not retrospective, with the high consumption charge to be activated when a Certificate of Compliance for water supply and sewerage is issued," Mr Rodgers said.

FOGO start set for October

More than 12,000 town residents will change to a new, innovative way to manage waste when Bega Valley Shire Council introduces the FOGO bin collection service from October 29.

More than 40 NSW councils are using FOGO which stands for Food Organics Garden Organics. In the Bega Valley, the new service will divert around 1000 tonnes of organic waste from landfill each year and turn it into high quality compost.

When FOGO starts, weekly collections will replace the current four-weekly garden organics collection for households who currently have a green bin service. There will be no change for people who don't have a green bin service.

Waste Services Manager, Toby Browne, said FOGO is a simple way to make a big improvement in waste management.

"Instead of sending food scraps to landfill, residents will be able to put them in with their garden waste which will be made into high quality compost at the Merimbula Recycling and Waste Depot," Mr Browne said.

"We are excited to introduce FOGO because it saves on landfill, results in a valuable resource

and gives us all an opportunity to be smarter with waste."

A \$641,400 Waste Less Recycle More grant from NSW Environment Protection Authority is helping with the transition, including the purchase and distribution of kitchen caddies.

Householders will know it's time to start

'FOGOing' when they receive their kitchen caddy, which is a small, lidded bin that can sit on the kitchen bench or under the sink.

Additionally, the grant will go towards a free waste hotline and enhanced features on the Bega Valley Waste APP. Information booths are also in Council libraries and tips and Council has established a dedicated FOGO webpage www.begavalley.nsw.gov.au/waste that includes frequently asked questions.

"Making sure there is no contamination of the compost product is the key to ensuring the success of FOGO, so it's really important we have the right information available on what waste goes in what bin," Mr Browne said.

"We understand and appreciate that change can be a challenge, but we have a great community here and most people understand how important it is that we reduce the amount of waste we produce, and ensure that we recycle as much as possible."

The Waste Less Recycle More program aims to encourage local communities to think differently about waste avoidance, recycling, littering and illegal dumping.

It funds projects which deliver conveniently located, value-for-money waste infrastructure that makes it easier for households and business to 'do the right thing'.

It also encourages innovative regulatory approaches to protecting the environment and supports investment in new waste programs.

Celebrating National Tree Day

Bega Valley Shire Council celebrated National Tree Day this year by providing 2000 trees and tree guards to Far South Coast Landcare for Bega Valley Landcare group revegetation projects.

The plants are locally sourced natives funded by fees from tree action requests received by Council.

Council's Environmental Services Coordinator, Michael Fiedler, said plant giveaways have been held in previous years; however in 2018 BVSC is trialling giving the plants to the Landcare groups.

"The idea behind the plant donation is to replace trees removed for safety and development reasons with new trees and, while the plant giveaways have been popular, there was a far greater demand for smaller shrubs appropriate for backyards," Mr Fiedler said.

"We hope that by supporting the various Landcare groups in this way the replacement of more trees in the landscape will be achieved."

Far South Coast Landcare Coordinator, Chris Post, welcomed the announcement.

"It is great to see this sort of support, as it recognises the important role that Landcare groups provide in terms of delivering positive community and environmental outcomes," Mr Post said.

The trees will be planted in spring when they will have the best chance of establishing.

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ClubGRANTS supporting the community

Inspiring work being carried out by organisations across the Shire to improve community wellbeing and address social issues was highlighted at the recent Bega Valley ClubGRANTS presentation.

The announcement of \$65,460 to assist with the implementation of 34 community projects follows on from an earlier \$31,000 allocation to support the Tathra and District Bushfire Recovery efforts under this year's Category 1

Bega Valley ClubGRANTS have now contributed close to \$1.4 million to the local community across the last 15 years.

The ClubGRANTS scheme is managed by Bega Valley Shire Council, but it is a shared State Government and club industry program, funded by a gaming machine tax on registered clubs with gaming machine profits in excess of \$1 million.

Six local clubs and the Bega Valley Shire Council were represented on the local ClubGRANTS committee this year - Bermagui Country Club, Club Bega, Club Sapphire, Eden Fishermen's Recreation Club, Merimbula RSL, and Tathra Beach Bowling Club.

The chairperson of the Bega Valley ClubGRANTS committee, Robert Beuzeville, said the funding of the 34 projects would benefit a range of local community activities and consolidate the program's exceptional history.

Some of the organisations and projects funded in 2018 include:

- Bega Valley Community Forum supporting and advocating for people who live with chronic pain.
- Rotary Beekeeping For Life Youth Program - working with Bega High School's special education students to develop skills in beekeeping husbandry.
- A new music streaming platform developed for musicians with disabilities in the South East region.
- Youth workshops held at the Eden Community Access Centre that use technology such as virtual reality hardware and video game software to teach young people the skills required to make video games.
- Little Wings Bega Flight Program a transport service for seriously ill children and their families requiring treatment at the Children's Hospital in

Merimbula water supply interruption

Residents and businesses in the Merimbula CBD and Fishpen areas will be without water overnight on Tuesday, 21 August to enable the construction of a new water pipe to the new supermarket development.


The water will be switched off at 11:00pm on the Tuesday night and is expected to be turned back on by 4:00am Wednesday morning (22 August).

Council's Water and Sewer Assets Coordinator, Chris Best, said the new pipe will lead to improved flow and fire safety for the Merimbula CBD.

"The work that the local contractor and developer are doing will make Merimbula CBD safer by supplying larger volumes of water when a structure fire or bush fire threatens our community," Mr Best said.

"The timing of the work is aimed at reducing disruption as much as possible, however if you are situated in the impacted area it is vital that you have enough water stored in containers for your needs." 

Alcohol Free Zones

On the back of an application from Bega Police and the Bega Valley Shire Liquor Accord and a recent public consultation period, Council has resolved to establish a new alcohol free zone in the Bega CBD and re-establish the Merimbula CBD zone.

Signage will be put in place to identify these areas.

Hotel Australasia

This longstanding matter was back before Council after legal representatives of developers Irisha Pty Ltd and Rubycove Pty Ltd informed Council recently that they no longer wished to purchase the heritage listed building.

After formally accepting this correspondence, Councillors resolved to put the sale out to the market, with the three Eden based real estate agents to be given the opportunity to provide a detailed marketing plan to Council - including costings related to commissions and expected expenses.

Council officers are then in turn to provide a further report to Council, with a view to moving the process forward in a timely manner.

Weed Management Plan

Council has adopted the principles and priorities identified within the South East Strategic Weed Management Plan and further prioritised actions through eight local management programs within the Bega Valley Shire Local Weed Management Program.

The plan was the subject of a recent public consultation period.

Native Title Claim

Council will request to become party to the application lodged by the South Coast People in the Federal Court for determination of Native Title.

This in relation to land south of Sydney including the Bega Valley Shire Local Government area.

Merimbula Aldi

There will be no reduction in Section 94 contributions payable

by the developers of the Aldi Supermarket in Merimbula.

The decision comes following an application by the developers to have the fees waived on a number of public benefit grounds.

Flood damage work continues

Works to repair roads infrastructure damaged during the 2016 East Coast Low flood event continue across the Shire.

The Upper Brogo area, Summerhill Road at Yowaka and Kameruka Street in Bemboka are the latest to come in for attention from our local contractors John Michelin and Son Pty Ltd and RD Miller Pty Ltd.

Tasks undertaken have included gravel re-sheeting, road shoulder scour repairs, pipe replacements, unblocking culverts and drainage devices, repairing landslips,

repairing damaged culverts and removing trees and debris from watercourses.

Funding for these projects was obtained from the Public Works Authority Natural Disaster Relief Arrangements Program that is administered through the Roads and Maritime Service.

It is expected that all of the 480 damaged areas will be repaired by Christmas, only 15 months after the schedule of works was received from the RMS.

Planning proposal for Wolumla

A draft planning proposal that amends the Bega Valley Local Environmental Plan 2013 (LEP) to allow for an additional supply of residential land in Wolumla is currently on exhibition for public comment.

This planning proposal outlines the zoning and minimum lot sizes for four 'deferred sites' under Council's previous Bega Valley Local Environmental Plan 2002.

Town Planner, Rob Quick, said that the majority of the land had been identified for future growth as part of previous planning schemes, pending further investigation.

"The proposal provides for the supply of additional residential land in Wolumla and will be supported by a more detailed place-based review of the village that focuses on the needs of the community over the next 20 years," Mr Quick said.

Outdoor teams on the job

Bermagui

The footpath leading to the Bridge Motors Reserve toilets has been replaced and the toilet block is set for a paint job.

An old damaged fence adjacent to Dervillaea Lane has been removed and replaced with new bollards.

The doors, hinges and latches on the toilets adjacent to the Surf Club have been replaced resulting in improved access and privacy.

The Payne's Island toilet block has also come in for some attention, with roof repairs increasing natural light and preventing leaks.

Bega

Damaged and sunken pavers in Carp Street and Ayres Walkway have been replaced, while a street furniture program is underway, with timber being cleaned, planed and re-stained and bolts being replaced.

Merimbula

New gardens have been installed around the boat ramp in Merimbula. They feature all native planting with Grevilleas, Flowering Gums, Blue Lomandras, Westringias, Happy Wonderers and other grasses being established.

Eden

Spraying

Glyphosphate spraying will be undertaken by all the teams through until April 2019 to suppress the encroachment of grass onto a variety of assets.

Portrait Award judge announced

Dr Andrew Frost has been announced as the guest judge for this year's Shirley Hannan National Portrait Award.

Dr Frost is a researcher in cinema and contemporary art and the art critic for The Guardian Australia.

He has also written and presented several ABC documentaries on Australian contemporary art, along with writing and directing My Space Program: The Art of Peter Hennessey.

Now one of the nation's richest, the \$50,000 non-acquisitive prize for realistic portraiture has run biennially at the Bega Valley Regional Gallery (BVRG) since 2002.

BVRG Director, Iain Dawson, said a prerequisite for the award is that those works selected to hang depict their subjects accurately and demonstrate a sound skill and knowledge of drawing and painting technique.

"We are very excited about the calibre of entries we have already received this year and there is no doubt that the 2018 winner will be an outstanding example of contemporary portraiture," Mr Dawson said.


wealth of Australian Art knowledge

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Tathra & District Recov

Revegetation planning

Council's Environment and Recreation sections have been developing a restoration plan for the reserves that border Tathra Headland which were was severely impacted by the bushfire.

This is being done in consultation with key community groups.

Some of the Melaleuca in particular is not showing signs of recovery.

As part of the Green Shoots program Council is intending to host community replanting events as part of the restoration of what is one of the most beautiful and scenic locations in Tathra.

Council will promote these events and invite community participation once dates are finalised.

The popular Tathra Forest Wildlife Reserve was severely impacted by the bushfire, including damage to viewing platforms, bridges, walking tracks and interpretive

This area is popular with local residents and visitors alike and Council is working closely with the Community Trust that manages the Wildlife Reserve to see this area open to the public as soon as possible.



The Trust has received funding to carry out repair works to the various 'built' facilities within the reserve and these works have now commenced.

Erosion control works have been carried out and replanting of some of the sensitive sections of the reserve will occur in Spring or when conditions become more favourable.

Majority of dangerous trees removed

The majority of dangerous trees within Tathra have now been removed by contractors being coordinated by NSW Public Works Advisory.

There are still a number of trees to be removed in the Tathra River Estate area.

It is hoped that these works will occur in coming weeks once issues around proximity to powerlines and access are addressed.

Council has received concerns that there have been trees removed that are showing signs of recovery, with epicormic growth starting to appear.

Unfortunately these trees were identified to have severe structural or stability issues that made them unsafe and unsuitable to remain close to homes.

Environmental protection and restoration

Council in partnership with Local Land Services and the Bega Local Aboriginal Lands Council has been carrying out soil stabilisation and erosion control works throughout the forested areas west of Tathra, through to the Bega River, Racecourse Creek Wetlands and Blackfellows Lake.

Erosion control works have also been implemented along the clifftop reserves from Tathra Headland to Kianinny and in some key locations at Vimy Ridge.

The basic measures that were put in place have proved effective in trapping sediment during the small rainfall events that have occurred.

These works have proved particularly important in the heavily disturbed areas immediately adjoining the urban interface of Tathra.

Council has been successful in receiving grant funding from the Department of Primary Industries – Crown Lands, to purchase erosion control products and to fund

environmental restoration.

In coming months erosion control products such as coir logs, jute fabric and sediment control mesh will be put in place now that demolition, tree removal and asset protection zone clearing works have been completed.

Council will also be using hydro mulch and native grass seeds on the large areas of exposed soil in the areas behind Ocean View Terrace. Wildlife Drive and Dilkerra Road.

Safe disposal of treated timber Asbestos in public reserves

Council is aware of a number of CCA treated timber retaining walls that suffered varying degrees of damage during the bushfire event.

Council and NSW Public Works have been promoting the need to appropriately dispose of these materials due to the risk of environmental harm.

To date there has been relatively little uptake of the offer of assistance for offsite removal and transport of CCA Treated Timber waste by the NSW Pubic Works Advisory.

Should residents want further information, there has been a factsheet prepared following the fires.

Post fire inspections of the public reserve areas identified several loose fragments of asbestos that is believed to have been disposed of during historical building works.

NSW Public Works Advisory have been assisting Council in seeking State Government support to fund the removal of the asbestos.

Public Works engaged a specialist Occupational Hygienist who identified and treated fragments in order to stabilise them prior to their removal.

The required environmental and safety approvals have been received and Public Works will soon be engaging a contractor to remove the asbestos fragments in accordance with EPA guidelines.

Tathra & District Recov

Construction commences Recovery and resilience grants

The bushfire recovery efforts reached a significant milestone since our last edition of Council News, with construction commencing on some homes.

Over 80 people have now visited the **Recovery Support Service in Tathra** for assistance with matters ranging from Development Applications and insurance through to navigating government departments, employment and wellbeing.

The service is open six days a week (see flyer below right for full details).

A women's morning tea is being organised by the Chaplaincy Network for 1 September.

Clinical Psychologist, Ruth Holt, will be the guest speaker.

The monthly community recovery meetings at Tathra Public School continue to be well attended (see below for all the dates).



- ✓ First rebuilding has commenced.
- √ 68 applications approved for demolition.
- √ 6 applications approved to rebuild dwellings.
- √ 10 applications approved to rebuild retaining walls.
- ✓ The removal of dangerous trees is well advanced.

The Tathra and District Recovery and Resilience Grants Program is now open.

The grant program will add to the work already undertaken by community members and volunteers across the Shire.

The Tathra and District Recovery and Resilience Activities Program has been developed in response to the March 2018 bushfires.

The program will facilitate social engagement activities to assist members of the Tathra and District communities to link back into their support networks, tell their experiences, address issues arising from the disaster and build a greater sense of future safety.

Individuals and groups are encouraged to consider activities and events that will foster social cohesion, resilience and wellbeing in residents and home owners

and apply for support through the grants program.

Activities must be driven by local people and groups with the purpose of assisting affected communities to heal and grow stronger into the future.

There will be two rounds for grant distribution, with \$25,000 available in each. Non-incorporated groups may apply for up to \$1,000 and incorporated groups may apply for up to \$5,000.

Program timelines are:

Round 1 applications close on August 31, 2018.

Round 2 applications close October 31, 2018.

The Tathra and District Bushfire Recovery Centre and Information Point has transitioned to the Recovery Support Service (RSS).

This service is available to anyone who feels they have been impacted by the Tathra and District fires.

The Recovery Support Service will be open for 12 months at Unit 6 Tathra Beach House Apartments in Tathra. The service's Recovery and Resilience Officers, who are qualified caseworkers, can also offer home visits for greater convenience.

Our Recovery and Resilience Officers will offer you one-on-one assistance with your personal and practical needs such as:

- · Working out what needs to be done and developing an action plan
- · Finding out what financial and non-financial supports are available to you
- · Assisting with referral and application processes
- · Managing grief and loss
- · Navigating insurance and the rebuilding process
- · Liaising with Centrelink and other government bodies to complete paperwork
- Developing strategies on how best to support children, families and yourself

The service is available Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9.00am -4.30pm; with extended hours from 9.00am - 7.00pm on Thursdays. The service will also operate from 9.30am - 4.30pm on Saturdays.
