Building their futures

The consistent quality of Council's early childhood services has again been highlighted through the National Quality Standard (NQS) Assessment and Rating Process, with the Eden Child Care Centre recently identified as 'Exceeding the National Quality Standard'.

The NQS sets a national benchmark for early childhood education and care, and outside school hours care services in Australia and includes seven quality areas that are important outcomes for children.

Services are assessed and rated against the NQS, and given a rating for each of the seven quality areas, as well as an overall rating based on these results.

The seven quality areas are educational program and practice; children's health and safety; physical environment; staffing arrangements; relationships with children; collaborative partnerships with families and communities; and governance and leadership.

Eden Child Care Centre's Nominated Supervisor, Annette Coleman, said the 'Exceeding' rating (the highest achievable) affirms the high quality of service that is provided at Eden

Child Care Centre to the families of Eden and surrounds.

"We are obviously delighted with the overall result and the fact that the Department of Education assessor commended us on making sure that all children and their families' needs are supported in an individual and inclusive environment was particularly pleasing," Ms Coleman said.

"This aligns with our focus on building meaningful relationships with all the children and their families to promote opportunities for learning."

Planning proposal to provide certainty

A draft planning proposal to introduce an existing holdings map set and amend the Bega Valley Local Environmental Plan 2013 (LEP) is currently on exhibition for public comment.

Bega Valley Shire Council has undertaken an analysis of the rural residential land supply across the rural catchments of the Shire. A key part of the analysis was reviewing the remaining supply of vacant existing holdings.

The analysis has identified an issue with what is commonly referred to as the 'Sunset Clause' in relation to land identified as an existing holding.

The 'Sunset Clause' is due to expire on the sixth anniversary of the commencement of the LEP

(2 August 2018). Once expired, the provision for the permissibility of a dwelling on land identified as an existing holding will cease to exist.

The exhibited draft proposal would remove the 'Sunset Clause' and preserve a dwelling opportunity on land identified as an existing

The Acting Manager Planning and Sustainability, Derek Van Bracht, said that Council has an explicit desire to retain the dwelling opportunities previously provided in perpetuity by the Bega Valley LEP 2002.

All three of Council's Centre-based early childhood services have now been assessed as 'Exceeding the National Quality Standard', with Bandara Children's Services and Eden Preschool receiving the same independent rating in recent years.

Council's fourth service, Sapphire Mobile Preschool at Candelo and Bemboka, does not undergo accreditation due to its status as a mobile service. However, the preschool operates under the same philosophy and quality service structure as Council's other early learning centres.

The National Quality Framework (NQF) for early childhood education and care was agreed

by all Australian governments to get better educational and development outcomes for children using education and care services.

Implementation of the NQF is guided by the Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority (ACECQA).

Recovery Centre phone outreach

The Tathra and District Fire Recovery Centre doors are still open and it is not too late for those adversely impacted by the fire, to register to enable access to recovery services.

This week, Recovery Centre staff will begin a telephone outreach program to reconnect with people who have previously contacted the centre.

All registered people who have given permission for further contact will be telephoned as a way for the Recovery Centre to touch base with people, see how recoveries are progressing and to check people are able to access the support they need.

Recovery Coordinator, Euan Ferguson said that information obtained from outreach conversations will be used to target support services, aid the recovery process and to assist in further planning for longer term recovery.

"The early recovery work on cleaning up and making properties safe is nearing completion so now is a good time for us to reflect, draw out experiences and note observations regarding the recent recovery operations.

"We invite those affected to please provide feedback so that recovery agencies will be better able to plan, develop and coordinate recovery and support services," he said.

The phone conversation will take about 20 minutes and can easily be rescheduled to a more convenient

time, if necessary.

Feedback from the phone outreach program will be incorporated into a report for the Health and Wellbeing Subcommittee and the Recovery Centre. No personal details will be identifiable within that report and all information will be treated as confidential.

The next Community Recovery Update Meetings will be held at the Tathra Public School on Thursday, 17 May - there will be afternoon and evening sessions.

The Tathra and District Bushfire Mayoral Appeal Fund has passed the \$1 million mark!

A delighted Bega Valley Shire Council Mayor, Cr Kristy McBain, made the announcement this week in addition to providing information on the first phase of distribution.

"The generosity that has come from right across the country has been nothing short of incredible," Cr McBain said.

"Businesses big and small, service clubs, sporting groups, local Councils, schools and individuals are among those who have contributed so selflessly and we couldn't be more thankful.

"Australians have a great way of banding together in the challenging times and the nation's collective embrace of those impacted by the disaster has been extremely encouraging and comforting.

"Donations are continuing to come in and with the Band Together concert coming up on 26 May we are very much looking forward to seeing the fund continue to grow in the future," Cr McBain said.

Importantly the time has now come to commence the distribution process and get the money out to

those who need it.

In compliance with the Commonwealth charitable law requirements, a Mayoral Appeal Fund Distribution Committee has been established to oversee the allocation of money based on applications received.

which is being chaired by the Mayor, also comprises four community members, in addition to Council's Director Business and Governance, Graham Stubbs, and the Deputy Mayor Cr Liz Seckold.

Phase one of the distribution will focus on owner/occupiers whose homes have been destroyed and tenants of destroyed rental properties. These people will be contacted by Council.

There will be a number of allocation phases and the details surrounding

each will be announced by the committee at the appropriate time.

In light of the overwhelming number of donations, receipts are being generated by Council staff for credit card donations and they will be distributed this month.

The advice from the Australian Tax Office is that a receipt is not required to claim a tax deduction for direct deposits – reasonable details of your donation (i.e. your bank transaction to the Mayor's Appeal account) is sufficient evidence.

All results from the asbestos air monitoring program continue to be negative and indicate no health risk for airborne asbestos.

Tathra Headland walk a reality

The reality of a scenic walkway around the Tathra Headland is a step closer after a funding commitment of \$1.2 million from the NSW Government.

Premier, Gladys Berejiklian, made the welcome announcement when she visited the Shire in the aftermath of the Tathra and District bushfire emergency.

This community driven project, known as the Tathra Headland Wharf Access (THWA) project, was initiated in December 2014 by local residents forming a steering committee with the aim of creating a safe and accessible pathway linking the historic Tathra Wharf to the Tathra Headland and replacing the former Ring Road.

The narrow remains of that road pose problems to users with steep gullies leading down into the ocean, irregular surfaces, no significant signage and no guard railing.

Council's Manager, Leisure and Recreation, John Grady, said that the proposed pathway will be a big improvement and enable much improved access.

"The proposed design and concept plans are in-depth and take into account accessibility for everyone, blending the pathway with the natural environment, absorbing cultural elements and greatly improving visitor safety," Mr Grady said.

The THWA Steering Committee initiated comprehensive consultation with community groups and all levels of government to gather information, which formed the basis of their proposal to Council.

In October 2016, all Councillors voted in support of allocating \$50,000 to fund a consultant to carry out a more detailed project analysis. The Steering Committee also contributed \$25,000 of in-kind support to the project.

Subsequently, the Sydney based firm, Thompson Berrill Landscape Design (TBLD) was appointed and in June 2017, the Steering Committee had a final report to present.

Steering Committee member, Margaret Taylor, said that both the committee and the community are delighted at the announcement of the State Government funding commitment.

"This project demonstrates the capacity of community to engage and work proactively with local and state governments over a two year period to achieve what will become a world class tourist destination facility," Ms Taylor said.

"It has also involved the coming together of different community groups, including the Access and Inclusion Advisory Committee and local Aboriginal representatives to turn an undervalued and inaccessible resource into a place where everyone can enjoy our beautiful environment."

The proposed walkway will provide uninterrupted 180 degree views of the ocean and will incorporate a whale watching platform to enable people of all abilities to access and enjoy the Tathra headland.

Interpretative and educational elements will be included to reflect the Aboriginal, European and natural heritage value of the area.

The pathway will be 2.5 metres wide, 260 metres long, will feature an accessible pathway from the top carpark to a viewing platform and an assisted access pathway from the platform to the wharf.

Funding to construct the walkway comes from the state government's \$300 million Regional Growth Environment and Tourism Fund.

Bridge upgrade near complete



The partial replacement of the Murrabrine Creek bridge is nearing completion.

The partial replacement of Murrabrine Creek bridge on Wandella Road (opposite the Cobargo Hotel) continues to progress.

The project, which includes upgrading the existing northern abutment to a reinforced concrete structure, is expected to be completed in the coming weeks, with foundations and temporary supporting structures finalised and the main abutment wall partially completed.

Work continues on the construction of the reinforced concrete abutment and wing walls.

Road users are advised there may be minor disruption to property accesses and traffic flows.

Work crews will be on site from Monday to Friday between 7am and 6pm.

Lake Street concepts on exhibition



Three options for a shared path linking Rotary Park and the Merimbula Wharf via Bar Beach are on exhibition for comment.

Comments from the community are invited on the draft concept plans for the Lake Street Shared Path Project in Merimbula that are on exhibition until 18 May.

The project that started as a community project proposal from the Bureau of Accessible Tourism (BOAT) group is now being advanced after Council received a \$2,000,000 grant from the NSW Government under the 2017/18 Active Transport Program.

Active Transport funding is awarded to projects that make walking and cycling a more convenient, safer and enjoyable transport option that benefits everyone.

The project is designed to provide a vital connection with existing cycle paths that begin at Pambula Beach, traverse through Pambula, beside Arthur Kaine Drive and Merimbula Airport, and through the CBD of Merimbula to

Spencer Park and Lake Street.

Council's Manager, Project Development, Daniel Djikic, said one of the key objectives of the project is to make Merimbula a more access friendly place for all residents and visitors.

"This not only aligns with Bega Valley Shire Council's Operational Plan, but also the vision and goals and short-term priority proposals of the Bega Valley Bike Plan," Mr Djikic said.

"The shared path is proposed as an all-access, shared-use walkway, for use by pedestrians, joggers, parents with prams, cyclists, and those with limited mobility.

"In the interests of providing the best possible outcome, with due consideration given to the existing site conditions, available funding and delivery timeframes, Council engaged the services of Thompson Berrill Landscape Design

Pty Ltd to undertake a feasibility study of three possible options.

"The study assessed the three options against a list of project objectives and outlines the indicative costs of each.

"Following on from this work we are now very interested to hear the collective thoughts of the broader community on the project," Mr Djikic said

The construction of the shared path is planned to commence towards the end of 2018, with a target completion of mid-2019.

Hilda Rix Nicholas with 'Embellish'

'Embellish – Costume in the Art of Hilda Rix Nicholas' is an exhibition to delight and opened at the Bega Valley Regional Gallery (BVRG) last Friday.

The exhibition focusses on the artist's passion for post impressionistic depictions of her family and friends 'dressing up' and performing as both familiar and exotic characters.

BVRG Director, Iain Dawson, said that the gallery is lucky to hold three significant pieces of the artist's work in the gallery's collection, two of which are on display.

"In addition, we have several examples of the original costumes made or collected by Rix Nicholas on display and these will be a highlight for exhibition viewers," Mr Dawson said.

Well known author, Richard Travers, who is currently writing a biography on the artist, launched the exhibition along with Rix Nicholas' granddaughter, Bronwyn Wright, who is the custodian of the family collection, from which the majority of the exhibition has been sourced.

Long recognised as making a significant contribution to Australian art in the period between the First and Second World Wars, Hilda Rix Nicholas achieved a remarkable level of success during her lifetime

in Australia, France and the United Kingdom.

Proudly claimed as a 'local', Rix Nicholas lived and worked at 'Knockalong', her homestead and sheep farm near Delegate.

She settled there with her second husband in 1928, after returning to Australia riding the waves of international success after being made an associate of the Societe Nationale de Beaux Arts in France in 1926.

The 'Embellish – Costume in the Art of Hilda Rix Nicholas' exhibition continues until Saturday 16 June 2018.

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'Green Shoots' campaign launched

Bega Valley Shire Council officially launched the 'Green Shoots' campaign with a community working bee at Tathra Beach on Saturday, 28 April.

The working bee, held in partnership with Tathra Landcare, the Far South Coast Landcare Association and Tathra Beachside Caravan Park resulted in the planting of 300 native plants in fire affected sections of the coastal dunes adjacent to Tathra Beachside Caravan Park.

The plant community on the dunes plays an important role in protecting the beach from erosion caused by coastal storms and wind by locking up the sand and providing a protective buffer to the caravan park and other infrastructure. It also provides important habitat for many native birds and animals.

With the bushfire recovery phase now in full swing, the time has come to commence the restoration of natural areas in and around Tathra that were adversely impacted during the disaster - the 'Green Shoots' campaign aims to do this.

Council's Environmental Management Officer, Michael Fiedler, said a large number of people have expressed an interest in assisting with the rebuilding and

restoration of Tathra and Council hopes that 'Green Shoots' will give them something tangible to contribute to.

"In so many ways it is the pristine natural environment that provides our Shire with its identity and as a result we see this campaign as a very important aspect of the recovery process," Mr Fiedler said. "Further events and opportunities will evolve as we assess the damage of our natural areas and open them up to the public."

"The rural lands analysis identified that approximately 300 intact vacant existing holdings remain," Mr Van Bracht said.

"Importantly this proposal will provide land owners with much needed certainty and the capacity to potentially develop their land moving forward.

"Council has written to all property owners that we believe may benefit from this change. We also encourage anyone who believes that they may have a vacant existing holding to contact Council as soon as possible so staff can carry out the required research," Mr Van Bracht said.

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Council Meeting

Consent modification deferred

Council deferred a decision on whether to approve a modification to the development consent concerning the Merimbula Woolworths project.

The matter came before Council after a request was received from The Retail Group Pty Ltd on behalf of the landowner Merimbula Nominees Pty Ltd.

The request was that Condition 25 of the consent, which centres on the timeframe around the provision of 127 public car parking spaces, be amended to allow the developer an extension of nine months through to 21 November 2018.

Further responses will be sought from the developer on the completion of the development, including the rear service road, and another report will be prepared for the 23 May 2018 meeting.

Weeds Management Plan

Council resolved to adopt the principles and priorities identified within the South East Strategic Weeds Management Plan.

The Draft Local Weed Management Plan will now be placed on on public exhibition for 28 days.

Council will also write to the Minister for Primary Industries, The Hon Niall Blair, to seek funding for significant agricultural land for weed eradication, reduction and management.

Refugee Welcome Signs

Refugee Welcome signs will be installed on Council owned land near the entrance to Council's Library Services at Bermagui, Bega, Tura Beach and Eden.

Council has been registered as a Refugee Welcome Zone since 2013 through the Refugee Council of Australia.

Social and Affordable Housing

Council committed to work with community based organisations to identify land it could make available for a social housing initiative on the basis of a financial return to Council over the life of the lease.

A further report is to be prepared for Council within six months.

Council will also advocate, either through the Canberra Region Joint Organisation or directly to the NSW Government, that it consider adopting a similar program to the Victorian Government's 'Social Housing Investment Planning' Grants Program to Local Government.

Officers will work with a relevant partner organisation to identify Council owned and/or managed land suitable for future applications to the NSW Government's Social and Affordable Housing Fund.

Pambula 'No Stopping' Zone

Council adopted a Bega Valley Local Traffic Committee recommendation that a 'No Stopping' zone be installed on the western and eastern sides of the Ives and Toallo Street intersection in Pambula (opposite Mitre 10).

Residents in the area had requested the change.

Tura Beach Reserves

Cr Nadin raised a Notice of Motion concerning the Site Management Plan for the Tura Head (the Point) and Dolphin Cove Reserves.

It was resolved that amendments concerning bollards, vegetation removal and signage be made to the plan.

Further clarification will be provided to Councillors on vegetation management, options for clearing some vegetation and the potential for future understory density reduction.
