Locals among Hannan finalists

Three Bega Valley artists are among the finalists for this year's Shirley Hannan National Portrait Award, cementing the regions reputation as a hot spot for artistic prowess.

Joseph O'Gara from Eden made the final cut with his *Weary Warrior*. The other local finalists include Bega resident, Tim Moorhead, with *Cincuenta Man Self Portrait* and Bermagui artist, Bethany Thurtell with her work, *Subjective*.

The finalists for this year's Award were announced last week with 35 standing out among the record number of entrants from across Australia.

The nation's most loved and richest realistic

portrait award carries an impressive \$50,000 prize.

The Award is a non-acquisitive prize for realistic portraiture, held biennially at the Bega Valley Regional Gallery.

The exhibition will launch on Friday, 26 October when the 2018 guest judge, art critic and broadcaster, Dr Andrew Frost, will select the winner from a strong field of contenders.

Bega Valley Regional Gallery Director, Iain Dawson, praised the quality of entries.

"This year's entries were our strongest ever and audiences will see works from past winners,

Archibald Prize finalists, and many of Australia's best-known portraitists," Mr Dawson said.

The selection committee consisted of Brisbane based gallery director, Edwina Corlette; influential art collector and architect, Ross Bonthorne; Alaska Projects Director, Sebastian Goldspink; and International Art Services Business Development Manager, Alison Guthrie; along with members of the Hannan family.

Exhibition goers will have a chance to vote for The People's Choice Award to be announced at the end of the exhibition.

Shirley Hannan was a gifted portraitist, well known in the Bega Valley as a staunch supporter and generous patron of the arts.

Disabled spaces zero tolerance

The Mobility Parking Scheme (MPS) allows eligible people to park in designated disabled parking bays and also extends the time limit when parked in timed parking areas for those in our community with an eligible mobile disability or their carer.

Eligible people are issued with an MPS permit which must be displayed conspicuously within the vehicle to qualify for the parking concession.

Ineligible drivers parking a vehicle in designated disabled parking bays will be fined \$561 and lose 1 demerit point.

Parking even for a few moments to drop off passengers or to make a delivery is not acceptable unless you have a current MPS permit.

Council's rangers take a zero tolerance view of this parking offence.

A current and valid interstate or overseas disability parking permit may be used in New South Wales.

Merimbula ALDI sale settles

The introduction of an ALDI supermarket to the Merimbula streetscape has taken another huge step forward, with the sale of 103 & 105 – 107 Main Street officially settling.

Settlement of the sale comes quickly on the back of the Southern Joint Regional Planning Panel's recent

decision to approve the company's **Development Application valued** at \$6.9 million and means ALDI will now be moving ahead with their plans for the site.

ALDI Australia's spokesperson said the company was thrilled to have purchased a site for their store in Merimbula.

"We are proud to call ourselves 'Good Different' and offer a supermarket experience that is like no other in Australia," they said.

"We're excited to be opening a store in the community and look forward to showing local residents the difference ALDI can make to their wallets and lifestyles.

"At the moment, we are in the initial stages of design and hope to commence construction in 2019 we will keep the community updated as our plans progress."

Bega Valley Shire Council Mayor, Cr Kristy McBain, welcomed the news, describing it as another boon for the Shire.

"Promoting greater economic activity is a real focus for this Council and it is certainly encouraging to see businesses like ALDI wanting to get a foothold here," Cr McBain said.

"The finalisation of the sale means that locals and visitors alike will soon enjoy greater choice, the flowon influence of greater competition and more modern and comfortable shopping conditions.

FOGO comes to your place

Look out for the delivery of your new FOGO (Food Organics Garden Organics) caddy, marking a new era in waste management in the Bega Valley as we join 40 other councils in NSW already using FOGO.

Your caddy is a small, lidded bin designed to sit on your kitchen bench or under the sink and Council will be delivering these to households very soon in the weeks leading up to FOGO collections, which start on 29 October.

Mayor Cr Kirsty McBain noted that FOGO is a win-win for the community, diverting around 1000 tonnes of household waste from our landfills, turning it into high quality compost and reducing greenhouse emissions.

She said that a recent audit by Council found that an average of 38% of contents (by weight) of our rubbish bins is food.

"When this ends up in landfill and decomposes anaerobically it produces methane, which is a concentrated greenhouse gas; composting food waste reduces these gases.

"It's very exciting that FOGO is only weeks away from starting now and I can't wait to see the first lot of compost produced and being put to good use on gardens," she said.

Once residents receive their kitchen caddy they can start to use their FOGO bin - the green wheelie bin, which will be collected weekly from 29 October. Red bins will be collected fortnightly from 29 October.

The change applies to residents who currently

have a green bin collection service.

Waste and Recycling Manager, Toby Browne, says that it's very important people understand what sort of waste goes into which bin to avoid contamination.

"New technology in the collection trucks has been fitted to help with identifying contamination issues.

"The general guide is that anything that once

"Garden waste including trimmings, clippings and prunings (no branches over 50mm), dairy, meat and bones, egg shells, seafood, take away food, vegetable and fruit scraps.

"You can also add tissues, paper towels, shredded paper, kitty litter and animal droppings to your FOGO bin," he says.

Waste Management Coordinator, Joley Vidau, advises people to download and use the Bega Valley Waste App.

"It's the best way to stay up to date with bin collection days and has tips for better recycling

A \$641,400 Waste Less Recycle More grant from NSW Environment Protection Authority helped to purchase and deliver kitchen caddies. The grant has also contributed to the free waste hotline and enhanced features on the Bega Valley Waste App.

Lake Street scope change approved

Bega Valley Shire Council has received formal approval from the Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) to vary the scope of the Lake Street Shared Path Project in Merimbula.

The approval means that Council will now be able to proceed with the delivery of 'Option G' that involves the path now only linking Rotary Park with Bar Beach and the existing two-way road configuration along Lake Street being maintained.

Council was originally the recipients of \$2 million in funding under the NSW State Government 2017-18 Active Transport Program for the design and construction of a 1.7km shared use path from Main Street to the Merimbula Wharf along Lake Street, however following extensive community consultation it was resolved to pursue the truncated option.

Council's Manager Project
Development, Daniel Djikic, said
the design being undertaken
by Thompson Berrill Landscape
Design is progressing well, but
is dependent on the outcome of
the geotechnical, heritage and
ecological investigations, which are

currently being commissioned and undertaken.

"The intention is that the path will take the form of a simple onground concrete path adjacent to the existing road wherever possible, however four distinct treatments will be required," Mr Djikic said.


"As further design detail is developed more accurate costings will be prepared and by identifying different treatment types upfront it also provides the opportunity to package up sections of the work to get the most cost effective overall outcome.

"The project started as a community project proposal from the Bureau of Accessible Tourism (BOAT) and we will be providing regular updates to the group as we progress.

"Prior to construction commencing, a construction impacts plan will be developed and communicated to the relevant stakeholders and community," Mr Djikic said.

The final design is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Gallery upgrade is shovel ready

Progress towards the planned redevelopment of the Bega Valley Regional Gallery (BVRG) continues, with the Development Application now approved and the final business case submitted to the NSW Government's Regional Cultural Fund for assessment.

Encompassing expanded exhibition and storage spaces, contemporary environmental control and lighting and a hireable workshop space; the concept design also features a more welcoming and accessible façade that allows the community to view artworks 24/7.

BVRG Director, Iain Dawson, said a successful bid for funding could see work on the game changing project commence as early as the first half of 2019.

"This is a once in a generation opportunity to deliver an art gallery that is in line with the community's expectations and allows us to deliver a program of exhibitions and cultural activities that inspire, challenge and mirror the vision we have ourselves here in the Bega Valley," Mr Dawson said.

"I want to thank the community and our key stakeholders for their incredible support and the team here at Council who have worked tirelessly over the past 12 months to bring this elegant plan to life – excitingly we now stand shovel ready.

"The case for change is strong and there is a demonstrable need for updates to our much-loved gallery.

"We are all hopeful of a positive result, which will allow us to continue to grow our reach, broaden our offering and subsequently attract more and more people to participate in the visual arts in the Bega Valley.

"In 2017, the 22,000 visitors to the BVRG (40% of these were visitors to the Shire) added \$1.3million to the local economy.

"The proposed new gallery has the capacity to draw even more visitors and reach a broader local and tourist audience also," Mr Dawson said.

Through the investment of \$100 million over two years, the Regional Cultural Fund aims to strengthen regional arts, screen, culture and heritage, and revitalise local communities through strategic investment across NSW.

This round will offer applicants a share in \$47 million in funding, including \$5 million for regional library projects and public art.

Skateboarders on board with feedback



New infrastructure and mentoring opportunities were the priorities for participants in a skateboarding day held recently at the Bega Skate Park.

Skateboarders took the opportunity to let Council know their thoughts on improving the Bega Skatepark at a day dedicated to skateboarding workshops and competitions, with expert guidance from Ownlife.

Council's Community Development Officer, Angelique McKechnie, said that the Bega skatepark is a high use asset.

"We hope that the day has encouraged a feeling

of belonging and responsibility for the park's many users

"Feedback from the day tells us that added infrastructure at the skatepark is needed as well as mentoring opportunities for its users," she said.

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Council prosecutes vegetation vandalism

Bega Valley Shire Council has successfully prosecuted a Pambula Beach resident in the Land and Environment Court of NSW for unlawful clearing, destruction and poisoning of vegetation in Jiguma Reserve in 2016.

Council Compliance Officers sought to prosecute the resident through the Land and Environment Court of NSW due to the high value vegetation and sensitive coastal location that exists in the Reserve.

The Pambula Beach resident entered a plea of guilty and was ordered to pay a fine, compensation and costs in excess of \$20,000.

Council's Community Safety and Compliance Coordinator, Chris Pearson, said Jiguma Reserve is a valuable asset within the community, and is a significant part of the Shire's wilderness coast.



There have been a number of cases of unlawful clearing and environmental destruction across the Shire in recent years.

"The value of the vegetation in this area is considerable, housing habitat and endangered flora, providing coastal protection from the elements and forms important corridors for wildlife," Mr Pearson said. "Council takes a zero tolerance approach to the wilful and reckless damage of vegetation and is currently investigating other sites where similar destruction and clearing has occurred.

"Council uses surveillance cameras

and other techniques to assist in gathering information for prosecution and usually most offenders are unaware that they are being observed.

"The community are very helpful when we are investigating these types of incidents and we encourage anyone who sees another person causing damage to vegetation or notices dramatic changes to vegetation, including trees dying suddenly or the cutting, breaking or removal of vegetation from our Reserves to report it to Council immediately," Mr Pearson said.

Prosecution of these offences in the Land and Environment Court of NSW carry fines of up to \$500,000 plus restitution costs to rehabilitate the damage.



Yankees Gap Fire

Council formally thanked the emergency services, support agencies, community members and Council officers who have worked tirelessly in responding to the Yankees Gap Fire.

Council resolved to provide the same level of assistance afforded people affected by the Tathra, Vimy Ridge and Reedy Swamp Fire including access to the Recovery Support Service.

Council will waive waste fees, interest on General Rates instalments and all Council planning and development fees and charges for houses destroyed or damaged.

Electric Vehicle Charging

Council authorised the General Manager to sign a Licence to Occupy for the installation of a fast charging system at a preferred site in Bega and to continue further discussions with NRMA and/or other stakeholders to introduce appropriate electric vehicle charging stations elsewhere in the Shire.

Garbage Collection for Tourist Units

Council accepted the proposal to modify the standard collection service for multi-unit holiday complexes receiving FOGO services to help mitigate the problems managers of multi-unit dwellings are likely to face with the move to FOGO. This will allow for a weekly garbage collection rather than the standard FOGO fortnightly collection.

This arrangement will be applied consistently to all units within the complex at the written request of the tourism marketing program. Strata Manager or equivalent.

Pretty Point Bridge

Safe disposal of treated timber

Council is aware of a number of CCA treated timber retaining walls that suffered varying degrees of damage during the bushfire event.

Council and NSW Public Works have been promoting the need to appropriately dispose of these materials due to the risk of environmental harm.

To date there has been relatively little uptake of the offer of assistance for offsite removal and transport of CCA Treated Timber waste by the NSW Pubic Works Advisory.
