Funding dream for Shire

Children and volunteers are the big winners of a \$974,677 funding allocation to Bega Valley Shire Council announced recently through the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund.

The Member for Bega, Andrew Constance was joined by Bega Valley Shire Council Mayor, Kristy McBain, in making the announcement that is set to breathe life into a number of local community projects.

"This is fantastic news for residents right across the Shire and I thank Council for bringing these projects forward for consideration," Mr Constance said.

"Our community has been calling out for upgrades to local facilities and I'm thrilled these can now be carried out."

Cr McBain said that it was gratifying to see the variety of projects that will be activated to improve local facilities and services.

"It is particularly exciting to know that this funding will most benefit our children, volunteers and some of our smaller townships," Cr McBain said.

"Community hall kitchens, village

playgrounds, Bandara Children's Services, the Eden Log Cabin and the Wallaga Lake boardwalk, as part of the Great South Coast Walk, will all receive significant upgrades."

The Stronger Country Communities Fund was established to invest in infrastructure projects in regional NSW communities to improve the lives of residents and enhance the attractiveness of these areas as vibrant places to live and work.

The fund is part of the NSW Government's investment of \$1.6 billion in regional infrastructure to support growing regional centres, bolster local economies and support services in communities.

Council's Grant Funding Submissions Coordinator, Cecily Hancock, said that staff are now busy shortlisting projects ready for round two applications that close on 4 May.

Gallery architect announced

The proposed redevelopment of the Bega Valley Regional Gallery (BVRG) has taken another significant step forward, with the announcement today that Sibling Architecture has been selected to design the upgrade to the facility.

The design will play a key role in Council's application to the Regional Cultural Fund.

BVRG Director, Jain Dawson, said that

Mental health support after fires

Bega Valley Shire Council is very appreciative of \$250,000 in funding for extra counselling services aimed at residents affected by the Tathra/Reedy Swamp bushfire, announced by the Federal Government recently.

Senator Jim Molan, Patron Senator for Eden-Monaro, was in Bega to make the announcement.

South Eastern NSW Primary Health Network (PHN) will receive the funding to meet the need arising from the trauma and loss associated with the bushfire.

The funding will boost the capacity of local services, providing counselling to fire impacted people in the short to medium term.

Bega Valley Shire Council Mayor, Cr Kristy McBain, said that Council wholeheartedly thanks the Federal Government for their support of our community.

"I am grateful that all levels of government have responded so quickly; State Government funding will help us clean up the physical landscape and this Federal Government funding will help with the psychological scars, including for those people experiencing survival guilt.

"Rebuilding homes and people's lifestyles will be a long process and this funding is very welcome to enable those affected in the Tathra and Reedy Swamp areas to get help," she said.

Kristina Brenner, Council's Manager Community Connections, stated that the Federal Government's funding via the Primary Health

Network would assist local services to connect with more people, including those who have not yet reached out for support.

"I particularly encourage families, friends and neighbours to reach out to individuals who may be isolated or vulnerable and let them know that support is available," Ms Brenner said. Eden Waste Depot to open Sundays

Council has acted on concerns expressed following the decision to close the Eden Waste Depot to the public to enable the sorting and disposal of fire damaged asbestos and demolition debris stemming from the bushfire disaster.

As a result the site will remain open to the public for the disposal of household waste, garden waste and recyclables on Sundays between 7.30am and 4.30pm.

The landfill area of the site will be closed on Sundays and no large tipping vehicles will be permitted on site.

In order to facilitate this position, Council has advised those involved in the Tathra and Reedy Swamp bushfire cleanup that no disposal of demolition waste will be permitted at Eden on Sundays.

Council's Waste and Recycling Manager, Toby Browne, said the key reason for closing the Eden site was to ensure public safety and has asked everyone to be mindful of the challenges a disaster of this magnitude brings for the people directly affected, the broader community and recovery agencies.

"There will a large number of heavy plant and truck movements during the clean-up process, with potential

queueing, and trucks will have to undertake manoeuvres on the access road to reverse to the tipping sites," Mr Browne said.

"Traffic management was a key factor when authorities made the decision to restrict access to the public. Additionally, there will be large quantities of asbestos impacted waste coming into the site, and while the risks are being managed, having members of the general public on site is clearly an avoidable risk.

"Council is managing absestos according to strict SafeWork NSW and NSW EPA requirements, with control measures in place to ensure the the safety of staff, contractors and the general public and the protection of the environment.

"Council will also have continuous air monitoring on the Eden site to demonstrate the disposal activities are undertaken safely.

"We absolutely recognise the inconvenience to the Eden community, but we ask that people

consider the needs of property owners directly affected by the fire, and the immediate need to get those properties cleaned up swiftly and safely.

"Due to the nature of the event, we obviously didn't have time to consult widely with the Eden community regarding the use of the landfill at the Eden Depot, and authorities needed to make a quick and informed decision about how to best dispose of this waste in our Shire," Mr Browne said.

Merimbula Waste Depot is the nearest alternative facility to Eden and is open five days a week from 7.30am to 4.30pm. The two days it closes are Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Residents of Tathra and Reedy Swamp affected by the fires can still take trailer loads of waste to the Wallagoot Transfer Station at no cost (Wallagoot will remain open 7 days a week until 30 April).

Fees and charges relief

Bega Valley Shire Council has moved expeditiously to alleviate further financial burden on those impacted by the recent bushfire disaster, with a number of fees and charges set to be waived.

Last week's resolution of Council means that the General Manager is now able to authorise exemptions from water and sewer charges; waste fees; Development Application, Complying Development and associated fees; and interest on general rates instalments.

The General Manager will also be utilising her authority under the Local Government Act to issue Fire Works Authorisation Certificates for demolition works if required.

General Manager, Leanne Barnes, said that while the local community has displayed unbelievable resilience both during and in the aftermath of the event, it is vital that Council can provide a level of surety for those impacted moving forward.

"With many people set to remain displaced for the foreseeable future, it is absolutely vital that we do anything we can to help them get back on their feet," Ms Barnes said. "We must help people get back on their feet" - Leanne Barnes

"It was certainly encouraging to see how readily the Councillors embraced the recommended relief measures and staff will now liaise directly with all impacted home owners, business owners and residents to ensure they are firstly aware of the measures and that necessary adjustments are made.

"The intent of all fee and charge waivers is to ensure that Council works to assist residents maximise their rebuild funds.

"These measures will represent a proportion of the additional, unbudgeted costs to Council for the response and recovery activities, some of which may be recoverable and some will be a key part of Council's role in the recovery process over the next 12 to 18 months

"All costs, foregone income and other items will be captured in the recovery process and form part of the ongoing reporting on this incident," Ms Barnes said.

New roof for log cabin



The Eden Log Cabin is set for a facelift.

The iconic Eden Log Cabin will receive attention using \$141,136 of the Stronger Country Communities grant.

The cabin's roof is constructed from asbestos cement shingles, which have been deteriorating and now the roof will be replaced with regard to the heritage value of the building.

The kitchen will also receive new stainless steel benches, flooring and appliances.

Council's Cemeteries and Halls Officer, Karen Terwin, said that an improved kitchen and new roof will encourage an increase in the range of events and activities that can be held at the Log Cabin and allow the space to continue to be an important social hub.

"The upgrade will provide Eden and surrounding areas with a facility unlike anything currently available to the general public in Eden," Ms Terwin said.

"The property includes beautiful gardens where wedding ceremonies and photos have taken place in the past and a non-domestic kitchen will allow entire catered functions to be held at the facility."

New kitchens bring new opportunities

Kitchen facilities at the community halls in Kiah, Pambula, Tanja and Wolumla will be refurbished to the tune of \$143,636 thanks to the Stronger Country Communities fund.

The planned upgrades will include replacing old joinery and benches with full stainless steel benches; and the installation of double sinks and hand basins, new flooring, fridges and ovens.

"Small food producers in these areas will be able to safely and legally produce foods for sale at local markets and for wholefood organisations, providing new employment opportunities and growth within the region," Ms Terwin said.

"Not-for-profit community groups could also potentially provide further services to those in need."

Modern playgrounds for villages

Some of the Shire's smaller communities can look forward to upgraded playgrounds with contemporary equipment thanks to \$300,705 from the Stronger Country Communities fund.

The four playgrounds set to see significant improvements are Bemboka's Bicentennial Park, Cobargo's Apex Park, the Wyndham Memorial Park and Ray Whyman Reserve at Mogareeka.

Council's Recreation and Natural Assets Coordinator, John Turville, said that the Mogareeka playground was damaged in the 2016 East Coast Low storm event and that the other three playgrounds were due for renewal.

"It is exciting that this funding will enable us to move forward with the improvements," Mr Turville said.

"The renewal of the playgrounds will provide our local children with access to functional, safe and imaginative play spaces and will provide areas for families and community groups to gather in a social setting.

"Depending on the location, revamping the playgrounds will also include fencing, picnic tables and shelters."

First steps for Great South Coast Walk

Stage one of the Great South Coast Walk will get off the design board on the back of a \$225,500 funding allocation under the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

The very welcome cash injection will provide Council with the opportunity to work with the community towards realising a vision of a public walking track connecting Wallaga Lake and Tathra.

There are two elements to these proposed works that will result in a different experience for users.

The first involves the replacement of a key section of the popular Wallaga Lake Boardwalk, which was irreparably damaged in the 2016 East Coast Low storm event and eventually decommissioned.

The replacement section will be further inland and take the form of a low level structure, running for

approximately 200 metres.

Wallaga Lake is intermittently open and closed to the ocean and high water levels can prevent walkers from safely navigating the lake foreshore without a boardwalk.

The second element will be the construction of a gravel pathway that will extend access from the boardwalk onto Camel Rock, with

the aim of minimising disturbance to nearby cultural sites of significance to Aboriginal people.

Seating and shelters will enhance the walk and improve access for all residents and visitors.

Council's Recreation and Natural Assets Coordinator, John Turville, said that the boardwalk won't necessarily be replaced with another timber one.

"We'll be looking at a range of materials, particularly surfaces that will allow daylight to penetrate underneath to support plant regrowth," Mr Turville said.

Our library service recently received a national Local Government 'High Achiever' award in recognition for their quality programs that support diversity and engagement in our communities across the Shire.

Councillor, Jo Dodds nominated the Bega Valley Shire Library for the award which is determined by LG Focus, Australia's National Local Government online newspaper.

"In particular, the two programs that stood out for me were the Bega Valley Autism Lab and the Wallaga Lake genealogy photographic digitisation project," Cr Dodds said.

Since inception in 2016 and after mother Monika Ryan approached the library for support, the Bega Valley Autism Lab has gone from strength to strength and now runs as a stand-alone, sustainable community program.

The Wallaga Lake Genealogy Photographic project is a unique and extensive collection of over 400 photographs of First Nations people living at Wallaga Lake and Bermagui.

The photographs were all taken by Bermagui based artist and photographer, Penny Jones over a period of nearly thirty years, of the families living on Djiringanj country, part of the Yuin nation.

Thanks to a partnership between the library and South East Arts, some of the photographs were made into an exhibition, which has been on display at libraries over the summer.

Wrap up

Mayoral Minutes

Mayor Cr Kristy McBain delivered three Mayoral Minutes at the outset of the meeting.

The first centred on the bushfire emergency during which she formally extended the Council's support and thoughts to those impacted; extended Council's thanks to all the emergency services and agencies who responded; thanked those involved in the recovery process; and formally acknowledged the offers of support and donations of goods and financial support.

The Mayor also requested a change of date (from 2 May to 1 May) for the next Council meeting to allow herself and the General Manager to attend the Canberra Region Joint Organisation (CBRJO) Parliament House Sessions.

An update on the Eden Waste and Recycling Depot was also given.

All three Mayoral Minutes were unanimously supported.

Waving of fees and charges

Council has resolved to give authority to the General Manager to authorise exemptions from water and sewer charges; waste fees; Development Application, Complying Development and associated fees; and interest on general rates instalments for properties directly affected by the fires (see full story page 3).

Further education scholarships

Six locals will receive assistance towards their tertiary studies following the announcement of the 2018 Further Education Scholarship recipients. A total of \$5000 will be distributed through the program.

Regional Sports Infrastructure

Council noted the changes to the guidelines of the Regional Sports Infrastructure Fund (RSIF), specifically the requirement for a co-contribution of 25% of the total grant amount.

Council will proceed with funding applications to the NSW

Government's Regional Sports
Infrastructure Fund (RSIF) for the
Bega Valley Regional Sporting Hub
(Bega and Pambula Sportsgrounds)
and the Bega War Memorial Pool
redevelopment.

Twyford Hall

Council has deferred a decision on whether to make a contribution of \$20,000 toward the costs of professional services (estimated at \$40,000 in total), requested by Twyford Hall Inc, as they continue to seek grant funding to build Theatre Twyford.

A further report will be prepared for Council on where such a contribution could be potentially funded from.

Flood Study and Plan

"In partnership with the community we are aiming to boost our regional strategic advantage – for tourism and liveability; stimulate the local


economy – for sustainability, employment and innovation; and enrich our local communities – for wellbeing across generations.



"Following the 14 March resolution of Council to proceed with an application to the current round of the NSW Cultural Fund for the redevelopment of the current gallery site, we have been working closely with the NSW Cultural Infrastructure Projects Management Office.

"It's an incredibly exciting time, and even though the competition for funding is incredibly high, we are confident we will have a strong proposal and that there is a clear need for the facility to be updated.

"We were thrilled at the response from the community during the consultation phase last year, with the incredible number of people responding demonstrating how cherished the BVRG is as part of this community.

"This is a once in a generation opportunity to deliver an art gallery that is in line with the community's expectations and allows us to deliver a program of exhibitions and cultural activities that inspire, challenge and mirror the vision we have ourselves here in the Bega Valley.

"A stakeholders committee comprising community members



with expertise across the arts, regional tourism and Aboriginal communities, along with sector experts has been initiated and will be consulted at each milestone throughout the project in preparation for a submission in June.
